**Robert B. Reich** is a professor at Brandeis University and the Maurice B. Hexter Professor of Social and Economic Policy at Brandeis' Heller Graduate School. In 1992 Reich headed President Clinton's economic transition team. Under Reich the Family Medical Leave Act was passed and implemented, and he was instrumental in raising the minimum wage. Before serving in the Clinton administration, he was on the faculty of Harvard's Kennedy School of Government.
