In 1994, the Motor Voter Law took effect in Massachusetts. Before that time the process of registering a person to vote was more complicated. The goal of the Motor Voter law is to encourage community outreach by making voter registration forms readily available to people wherever they work, visit or otherwise conduct business. To achieve this goal we have set up distribution sites for voter registration forms throughout the City, and we also conduct voter registration training for the community.

2006 Election Calendar

State Primary

Wednesday, August 30

8pm: deadline to register to vote, change party enrollment, or notify Election Commission of change of name or address for State Primary Election.

In-person registration hours are 8:30am to 8:00pm at the Election Commission office.

Mail-in voter registration forms must be postmarked by midnight.

Saturday, September 16

9am – 5pm: Election Commission office open for over-the-counter absentee voting.

(Note: Absentee ballots will be ready before the beginning of September for over-the-counter and mail-in absentee voting).

Monday, September 18

Noon: deadline to apply for absentee voting, either for mail-in ballot or over-the-counter voting.

Tuesday, September 19

State Primary Election. **Polls are open 7am until 8pm.** Absentee ballots must arrive at Election Office by **8pm.**

General Election

Wednesday, October 18

8pm: deadline to register to vote or notify Election Commission of change of name or address for General Election.

In-person registration hours are 8:30am to 8:00pm at the Election Commission office.

Mail-in voter registration forms must be postmarked by midnight.

Saturday, November 4

9am – 5pm: Election Commission office open for over-the-counter absentee voting.

(Note: Absentee ballots will be ready before the middle of October for over-the-counter and mail-in absentee voting).

Monday, November 6

Noon: deadline to apply for absentee voting, either for mail-in ballot or over-the-counter voting.

Tuesday, November 7

General Election. **Polls are open 7am until 8pm.** Domestic absentee ballots must arrive at Election Office by **8pm.**

International absentee ballots must arrive at Election Office by **Friday, November 17 – 5pm.**

2006 Office Hours & Holidays

Mondays: 8:30am – 8:00pm. Tuesdays through Thursdays: 8:30am – 5:00pm. Fridays: 8:30am – 12:00 noon.

Voter Registration FAQ's

Who may register to vote in Cambridge? You may register to vote in Cambridge if you are a US citizen, a resident of Cambridge, and will be at least 18 years old on or before Election Day.

Can I register for a friend, family member, or another individual? No, this is prohibited under state law.

Where do I register?

The following options are available to the public when registering to vote. You can register:

1. At the Election Commission Office during regular and special office hours. See below for hours.
2. From your Cambridge address at any election office in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
3. By mail-in registration affidavit. Forms are available at the Election Office, local libraries, branches of the Post Office, Cambridge Hospital and the neighborhood health clinics, public housing locations, and many other city locations. Fill out an affidavit and mail it back to the Election Office.
4. To have a form mailed to you, call 1-800-462-vote or 617-722-2828, or request it on the web at <http://www.state.ma.us/sec/ele/elestu/stuidx.htm>
You may also use the federal voter registration form, which is available at the State web site.

Can I register if I am homeless? Homeless persons can use a shelter address or their prior address in Cambridge if that was the last place of residency. You can also vote from a location by using the diagram on the registration form.

Is identification required to register to vote? When you register, you must include your driver's license number or the last 4 digits of your social security number on the application. If the information cannot be verified or you do not provide this information, you must provide identification at your polling location when you go to vote. Sufficient identification includes a copy of current and valid photo identification, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document showing your name and address.

How do I change my political party? Send signed correspondence to the Election office with your request to change party affiliation, including what you would like your new affiliation to be. Voters who wish to change their party status may also use mail-in registration forms.

How do I change my address for voting? If moving to another city or town, re-registration is required if you wish to remain a voter. If moving within the City of Cambridge, send signed correspondence to the Commission stating your new address along with your former address. Mail-in registration forms may also be used to inform the Commission of the new address.

How do I change my name for voting? Send signed correspondence to the Election office informing the Commission of the name change. Be sure to include both your former name and new name. Mail-in registration forms can also be used to inform the Commission of a name change.

When is the Election Commission office open to the public? We are normally open on the following hours: Mondays 8:30am – 8:00pm, Tuesdays through Thursdays 8:30am – 5:00pm, and Fridays 8:30am to 12:00 noon. We are closed on holidays recognized by the City. We are open on certain special days and certain special hours to accommodate voter registration deadlines and absentee voting. See Election Calendar for special hours.

When am I registered to vote? You are registered to vote on the day you register in person at an official designated office or the postmark date on a mail in registration form. You must register by 20 days before an election to vote in that election. You should receive an acknowledgement notice within two to three weeks after you register. If you do not receive your acknowledgement notice, contact the Election Commission.

How may I verify that I am registered? You may contact the Election Commission at (617) 349-4361.

What is my ward and precinct? The ward and precinct determines where residents vote and in which elective district citizens reside. When you register to vote, the acknowledgement notice you receive includes your ward, precinct, and polling location. Click on link for your ward, precinct, and polling location. The staff can also provide information about elective districts, your current elected officials, and names of candidates in election seasons.

When can I register? Eligible persons can register at any time during the Election Office’s hours of operation or when outside sessions are conducted. Registration by mail can be done at any time.

Is there a deadline to register? One may register to vote at any time. However, the deadline to register for any given election is twenty days prior to that election.

What is my polling location? Your polling location is where you vote. You may click this link to see your polling location: [Your ward and precinct will determine your polling location.](#) You may also call the Election Commission at (617) 349-4361.

How do I stay on the voting list? Answering the city census each year ensures that your name will remain on the voting list once you have registered. If you move within the city, inform the Election Commission in writing about your change of address (see “How do I change my address for voting?”). If you were previously registered in another city or town, re-registration from the new address is necessary. You may also inform the Commission if your name changes and you wish to change it for the voting list. Massachusetts state law does not require that you vote in order to keep your name on the voting list.

How can I get a letter verifying that I am a registered voter? Voter registration letters or cards are not necessary for voting purposes. However, you may go to the Election Commission office and make a request for a letter verifying that you are a registered voter. A \$2.00 fee is charged for issuing a voter registration letter. You may also mail a receipt along with a check of \$2.37 (fee and postage) made payable to the City of Cambridge.

How can my group or organization request voter registration forms in bulk? Call the Elections Division at 1-800-462-VOTE or 617-727-2828.

How to use this form

1. Check all the boxes that apply to you.
2. Print your name: last name, first name, middle name or initial.
3. Print your former name, if applicable.
4. Print the address where you live now: number and street name or rural route number and box number (do not provide a post office box number), apartment number, city or town and full zip code. Use the map* at right if you cannot otherwise identify your address.
5. Print the address where you receive all your mail, if it is different from the address entered on #4.
6. Print your date of birth: month, day and year.
7. Federal law requires that you provide your driver's license number to register to vote. If you do not have a current and valid Massachusetts driver's license, you must provide the last four digits of your social security number. If you have neither, you must write "none" in the box.
8. It is optional to provide your telephone number. If you include your telephone number and do not check "unlisted" it will be a public record.
9. Check a party, "no party" or print a political designation (not a party).
10. Print the address where you were last registered to vote.
11. If a person is helping you because you are physically unable to sign this form, that assisting person must print his or her name and address and has the option to print his or her telephone number.
12. Read the oath.
13. Print today's date.
14. Sign your name.

This form may be mailed or hand-delivered to your city or town hall. If mailed, fold the form, tape it closed, place a first class stamp on it, print your city or town name and zip code for that city or town hall and drop into any mailbox.

You can use this form to

- register to vote in Massachusetts; and/or
- change your name or address for voter registration only; and/or
- join a party, change from one party to another or leave a party.

To register to vote in Massachusetts you must:

BE A U.S. CITIZEN; and


- be a Massachusetts resident; and
- be at least 18 years old on or before the next election.

Penalty for illegal registration: Fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than five years or both.

-Massachusetts General Laws, chapter 56 section 8.

Identification To Be Provided

Section 7 requires you to include your driver's license number or the last 4 digits of your social security number on this application. This information will be verified through the Registry of Motor Vehicles and the Commissioner of Social Security. If the information cannot be verified or you do not provide this information, you must provide identification either with this application or at your polling location when you go to vote. Sufficient identification includes a copy of a current and valid photo identification, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document showing your name and address.



*Using landmarks, draw the location of the place where you live if you cannot describe that location as a number and street or as a rural route and box number.

3 Steps to Register by Mail

1. Fill Out the Form
2. Sign Your Name
3. Mail your completed form to the Cambridge Election Commission, 51 Inman Street, Cambridge, MA 02139. For the address of other cities and towns contact the Secretary of State, Elections Department, 617-727-2828.

IMPORTANT REMINDER

- Congress passed the “Help America Vote Act” (HAVA) in 2002, which created a new voter registration form and identification requirements. Section 7 on the new voter registration form requires that a person provide a driver’s license number or the last four digits of a social security number. If a person has neither, “NONE” must be recorded in the box.
- When you register, you must include your driver’s license number or the last 4 digits of your social security number on the application. If the information cannot be verified or you do not provide this information, you must provide identification either with the application or at your polling location when you go to vote. Sufficient identification includes a copy of current and valid photo identification, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document showing your name and address.

Massachusetts Official Absentee Ballot Application

How to use this form

Box 1. Check all the boxes that apply to you. If the absentee ballot is to be used for a primary, circle the applicable party. **Remember**, in order to participate in a primary, you must be registered as a member of that party or as an unenrolled (independent) voter. Contact your town clerk, city clerk or election commission if you are unsure of your party designation.

Box 2. Print your name: last name, first name, middle name or initial.

Box 3. Print the address where you are registered to vote: number and street name or rural route number and box number (do not provide a post office box number), apartment number, city or town and full zip code.

Box 4. Check the appropriate box indicating your preference for obtaining your absentee ballot. Instead of having the ballot mailed to you, you have the option of voting at your city or town hall at a time arranged with the clerk or election commission. However, you must still submit a timely application. If you have entered a health care facility anytime after twelve o'clock noon of the 5th day before the relevant primary or election, contact the city or town clerk about the proper procedure to be followed. If the voter is applying for absentee ballots for all elections this year, be sure to notify the town clerk, city clerk or election commission of a change of mailing address.

Box 5. Print your date of birth: month, day and year.

Box 6. It is optional to provide your telephone number. If included and you do not check "unlisted" it will be a public record. Your telephone number may be used to contact you should a question arise concerning your application.

Box 7. It is optional to provide your e-mail address. If included, it will be a public record. Your e-mail may be used to contact you should a question arise concerning your application.

Box 8. Print today's date.

Box 9. Sign your name.

Box 10. If the applicant is unable to complete and sign this application because of blindness, physical disability, the inability to read or the inability to read English, any person designated by the voter may do so.

This application is for use by:

- A registered voter who will be unable to vote at the polls on election day due to:
 - absence from your city or town during normal polling hours; or
 - physical disability preventing you from going to the polling place; or
 - religious belief;

OR

- A non-registered voter who is:
 - a Massachusetts citizen absent from the state; or
 - an active member of the armed forces or merchant marines, their spouse or dependent; or
 - a person confined in a correctional facility or a jail, except if by reason of felony conviction.

Mailing instructions:

This application must be received by noon on the day before the election. This form may be mailed or hand-delivered to your city or town hall. If mailed, fold the form, tape it closed, place a first class stamp on it, print your city or town name and zip code for that city or town hall and drop into any mailbox.

Warning: Illegal absentee voting, including making a false application, is punishable by a fine of up to \$10,000 and up to five years in prison.
