In 1994, the Motor Voter Law took effect in Massachusetts. Before that time the process of registering a person to vote was more complicated. The goal of the Motor Voter law is to encourage community outreach by making voter registration forms readily available to people wherever they work, visit or otherwise conduct business. To achieve this goal we have set up distribution sites for voter registration forms throughout the City, and we also conduct voter registration training for the community.

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2007 Municipal Election Calendar

- July 2:** Municipal Election Nomination Papers available at Election Commission office, 8:30am – 8pm.
- July 31:** 5pm deadline to submit nomination papers & statements of financial interest for candidates.
- August 14:** 5pm deadline for Election Commission to certify signatures on nomination papers.
- August 16:** 5pm deadline for municipal candidates to file withdrawal of nomination.
- October 17:** 8pm deadline to register to vote in municipal election. In person registration hours are 8:30am to 8pm Election Commission office only. (Mail in registration must be postmarked by October 17).
- October 29:** 5pm deadline for **School Committee** candidates and **Political Committees** to file Municipal Campaign & Political Finance Reports. (**City Council** candidates should consult their OCPF packets regarding depository-filing requirements).
- November 2:** **Friday.** Election Commission will be open **8:30 am to 5 pm** for over-the-counter absentee voting.
- November 3:** **Saturday.** Election Commission office will be open 9am to 5pm for over-the-counter absentee voting.
- November 5:** Noontime deadline to apply for absentee ballot, either for mail-in or over-the-counter voting.
- November 6:** **Municipal Election. Polls are open 7am until 8pm.**
All absentee ballots must arrive at Election Commission **office** by 8pm to be counted.
Ballot count begins at Senior Center, 806 Massachusetts Avenue, Central Square after the polls close.
- November 7:** 9am – 5pm. Ballot count resumes at Senior Center, 806 Massachusetts Avenue, Central Square.

Mondays: 8:30am to 8pm

Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays: 8:30am to 5pm

Fridays: 8:30am to Noon

Holidays: The Election Commission will be closed for the following holidays:
July 4th (Wednesday), September 3rd (Monday), and October 8th (Monday).



Voter Registration Frequently Asked Questions

Who may register to vote in Cambridge?

You may register to vote in Cambridge if you are a US citizen, a resident of Cambridge, and will be at least 18 years old on or before Election Day.

Can I register for a friend, family member, or another individual? No, this is prohibited under state law.

Can I register if I am homeless? Homeless persons can use a shelter address or their prior address in Cambridge if that was the last place of residency. You can also vote from a location by using the diagram on the registration form.

Is ID required to register to vote? No. However, it is highly advisable to submit ID with your mail-in voter registration form. Otherwise, first time voters who register by mail are required to show ID at the polls. Suitable ID includes a copy of current and valid photo identification, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document showing your name and address.

How do I change my political party? Send signed correspondence to the Election office with your request to change party affiliation, including what you would like your new affiliation to be. Voters who wish to change their party status may also use mail-in registration forms.

How do I change my address for voting? If moving to another city or town, re-registration is required if you wish to remain a voter. If moving within the City of Cambridge, send signed correspondence to the Commission stating your new address

along with your former address. Mail-in registration forms may also be used to inform the Commission of the new address.

How do I change my name for voting?

Send signed correspondence to the Election office informing the Commission of the name change. Be sure to include both your former name and new name. Mail-in registration forms can also be used to inform the Commission of a name change.

Where can I register?

You have the following options:

- At the Election Commission Office during regular office hours.
- From your Cambridge address at any election office in Massachusetts.
- By mail-in registration affidavit. Forms are available at the Election Office, local libraries, branches of the Post Office, Cambridge Hospital and the neighborhood health clinics, public housing locations, and many other city locations. Fill out an affidavit and mail it back to the Election Office.
- To have a form mailed to you, call 1-800-462-vote or 617-722-2828, or request it on the web at <http://www.state.ma.us/sec/ele/elestu/stuidx.htm>
- You may also use the federal voter registration form, which is available at the State web site.

When is the Election Commission office open to the public? We are normally open the following hours: Mondays 8:30am – 8:00pm, Tuesdays through Thursdays 8:30am – 5:00pm, and Fridays 8:30am to 12:00 noon. We are closed on holidays recognized by the City. We are open on certain special days and certain special hours to accommodate voter registration deadlines and absentee voting. See Election Calendar for special hours.

When am I registered to vote? You are registered to vote on the day you register in person at an official designated office or the postmark date on a mail in registration form. You must register by 20 days before an election to vote in that election. You should receive an acknowledgement notice within two to three weeks after you register. If you do not receive your acknowledgement notice, contact the Election Commission.

How may I verify that I am registered? You may contact the Election Commission at (617) 349-4361.

What is my ward and precinct? The ward and precinct determines where residents vote and in which elective district citizens reside. When you register to vote, the acknowledgement notice you receive includes your ward, precinct, and polling location.

You can check for your ward and precinct by calling the Election Commission office or online at www.cambridgema.gov/election.

When can I register? Eligible persons can register at any time during the Election Office's hours of operation or when outside sessions are conducted. Registration by mail can be done at any time.

Is there a deadline to register? One may register to vote at any time. However, the deadline to register for any given election is twenty days prior to that election.

What is my polling location? Your polling location is where you vote. You may check online at www.cambridgema.gov/election to see your polling location. Your ward and precinct will determine your polling location. You may also call the Election Commission at (617) 349-4361.

How do I stay on the voting list? Answering the city census each year ensures that your name will remain on the voting list once you have registered. If you move within the city, inform the Election Commission in writing about your change of address (see "How do I change my address for voting?"). If you were previously registered in another city or town, re-registration from the new address is necessary. You may also inform the Commission if your name changes and you wish to change it for the voting list. Massachusetts state law does not require that you vote in order to keep your name on the voting list.

How can I get a letter verifying that I am a registered voter? Voter registration letters or cards are not necessary for voting purposes. However, you may go to the Election Commission office and make a request for a letter verifying that you are a registered voter. A \$2.00 fee is charged for issuing a voter registration letter. You may also mail a receipt along with a check of \$2.37 (fee and postage) made payable to the City of Cambridge.

How can my group or organization request voter registration forms in bulk? Call the Elections Division at 1-800-462-VOTE or 617-727-2828.

3. MAIL YOUR COMPLETED FORM TO THE CAMBRIDGE ELECTION COMMISSION, 51 INMAN STREET, CAMBRIDGE, MA 02139. FOR THE ADDRESS OF OTHER CITIES AND TOWNS CONTACT THE SECRETARY OF STATE, ELECTIONS DEPARTMENT, 617-727-2828.

IMPORTANT REMINDER

- Congress passed the "Help America Vote Act" (HAVA) in 2002 which created a new voter registration form and identification requirements. Section 7 on the new voter registration form requires that a person provide a driver's license number or the last four digits of a social security number. If a person has neither, "NONE" must be recorded in the box.
- Voters who have registered by mail since January, 2003, and who have not voted in a federal election since registering by mail must show identification. Acceptable identification must include voter's name and address where registered to vote. Examples are: driver's license, current utility bill, rent receipt, lease, paycheck, or government document.

Box 1. Check all the boxes that apply to you. If the absentee ballot is to be used for a primary, circle the applicable party. **Remember**, in order to participate in a primary, you must be registered as a member of that party or as an unenrolled (independent) voter. Contact your town clerk, city clerk or election commission if you are unsure of your party designation.

Box 2. Print your name: last name, first name, middle name or initial.

Box 3. Print the address where you are registered to vote: number and street name or rural route number and box number (do not provide a post office box number), apartment number, city or town and full zip code.

Box 4. Check the appropriate box indicating your preference for obtaining your absentee ballot. Instead of having the ballot mailed to you, you have the option of voting at your city or town hall at a time arranged with the clerk or election commission. However, you must still submit a timely application. If you have entered a health care facility anytime after twelve o'clock noon of the 5th day before the relevant primary or election, contact the city or town clerk about the proper procedure to be followed. If the voter is applying for absentee ballots for all elections this year, be sure to notify the town clerk, city clerk or election commission of a change of mailing address.

Box 5. Print your date of birth: month, day and year.

Box 6. It is optional to provide your telephone number. If included and you do not check "unlisted" it will be a public record. Your telephone number may be used to contact you should a question arise concerning your application.

Box 7. It is optional to provide your e-mail address. If included, it will be a public record. Your e-mail may be used to contact you should a question arise concerning your application.

Box 8. Print today's date.

Box 9. Sign your name.

Box 10. If the applicant is unable to complete and sign this application because of blindness, physical disability, the inability to read or the inability to read English, any person designated by the voter may do so.

This application is for use by:

- A registered voter who will be unable to vote at the polls on election day due to:
 - absence from your city or town during normal polling hours; or
 - physical disability preventing you from going to the polling place; or
 - religious belief;

OR

- A non-registered voter who is:
 - a Massachusetts citizen absent from the state; or
 - an active member of the armed forces or merchant marines, their spouse or dependent; or
 - a person confined in a correctional facility or a jail, except if by reason of felony conviction.

Mailing instructions:

This application must be received by noon on the day before the election. This form may be mailed or hand-delivered to your city or town hall. If mailed, fold the form, tape it closed, place a first class stamp on it, print your city or town name and zip code for that city or town hall and drop into any mailbox.

Warning: Illegal absentee voting, including making a false application, is punishable by a fine of up to \$10,000 and up to five years in prison.

How to use this form

Box 1. Check all the boxes that apply to the voter. If the absentee ballot is to be used for a primary, circle the applicable party. Remember, in order to participate in a primary, the voter must be registered as a member of that party or as an unenrolled (independent) voter. Contact the voter's town clerk, city clerk or election commission if he or she is unsure of their party designation.

Box 2. Print the voter's name: last name, first name, middle name or initial.

Box 3. Print the address where the voter is registered: number and street name or rural route number and box number (do not provide a post office box number), apartment number, city or town and full zip code.

Box 4. The ballot will be mailed to the voter. Print the voter's mailing address if it is different from their legal voting residence. If the voter is applying for absentee ballots for all elections this year, be sure to notify the town clerk, city clerk or election commission of a change of mailing address.

Box 5. Print the voter's date of birth: month, day and year.

Box 6. It is optional to provide the voter's telephone number. If the telephone number is included and "unlisted" is not checked, it will be a public record. The telephone number may be used to contact the voter should a question arise concerning the application.

Box 7. It is optional to provide the voter's e-mail address. If an e-mail address is included, it will be a public record. The e-mail address may be used to contact the voter should a question arise concerning the application.

Box 8. Print your name and relationship to the voter. Be sure that you qualify as a "family member" as defined at right.

Box 9. Print your address number and street name or rural route number and box number (do not provide a post office box number), apartment number, city or town and full zip code.

Box 10. Print today's date.

Box 11. Sign your name.

This application is for use by a family member of:

- A registered voter who will be unable to vote at the polls on election day due to:
 - (1) absence from your city or town during normal polling hours; or
 - (2) physical disability preventing you from going to the polling place; or
 - (3) religious belief;

OR

- A non-registered voter who is:
 - (1) a Massachusetts citizen absent from the state; or
 - (2) an active member of the armed forces or merchant marines, their spouse or dependent; or
 - (3) a person confined in a correctional facility or a jail, except if by reason of felony conviction.

A "family member" must be:

a spouse or person residing in the same household, in-laws, father, mother, sister or brother of the whole or half blood, son, daughter, adopting parent or adopted child, stepparent or stepchild, uncle, aunt, niece, nephew, grandparent or grandchild.

Mailing instructions:

This application must be received by noon on the day before the election. This form may be mailed or hand-delivered to your city or town hall. If mailed, fold the form, tape it closed, place a first class stamp on it, print your city or town name and zip code for that city or town hall and drop into any mailbox.

Warning: Illegal absentee voting, including making a false application, is punishable by a fine of up to \$10,000 and up to five years in prison.
